All plant needs are propagated onsite in a laboratory devoted entirely to seed potato tissue culture production. SSF mini tubers are shipped throughout the U.S., Canada, Chile, Thailand, Brazil, and the Middle East. Kitchen Farms employs 40 people and grows 1,200 acres of potatoes each year. Kitchen Farms washes and packages many varieties of potatoes to ship them across the country.  King Orchards (Central Lake) - 11 am - 1:00 pm Brothers John and Jim King, along with their wives, Betsy and Rose, and their children, have been growing fruit in Northern Michigan for over 30 years. They are a first-generation farm family, growing into the second. Their orchards are located on the northern edge of Michigan's famed cherry-growing region, atop glacier-formed ridges, and rolling hills near Torch Lake and Lake Michigan's Grand Traverse Bay.

1:30 - 3:00 PM	Matchett Sheep Farm (Charlevoix) Matchett Sheep Farm is a 4 <sup>th</sup> generation family farm that is home to 1800 commercial Polypay ewes. Ewes give birth in May and September utilizing an intensively managed pasture lambing system. Matchett Sheep Farm focuses on high-health status sheep, proper nutrition, & prolific genetics to keep their business productive and moving forward.	EV

4:00 - 5:30 PM	Shooks Farms & Cellar 1914 (Central Lake)  The farm was founded in 1914 (hence the name, Cellar 1914) by a gentleman named Vet Shooks. He drove by this property weekly on his way to church and noticed a cherry tree growing on the southwest side of the road. The cherries were producing quality fruit due to the proximity to Lake Michigan. Vet commented to his family that one day he would like to buy that property, because of how well it had produced those wild cherries, so that is exactly what he did. The rest is history. Now in the fourth generation, the farm has a dramatically different look and focus - fewer field crops and livestock and more cherries and grapes. The newest direction of the farm helps to bring the new (grapes/wine) in with the old (history). The tasting room was designed with the history of the farm in mind, placed at the heart of the farm, with views of Lake MI.
